## **COUNCIL REQUEST FOR DECISION**

SUBJECT:	Cannabis Retail Stores in Drayton Valley
MEETING DATE:	June 28, 2018, Special Meeting of Council
SUBMITTED BY:	Pam Livingston, Acting CAO and Chandra Dyck, Legislative Services Coordinator

### **PROPOSAL AND BACKGROUND:**

The Government of Canada has indicated that non-medical cannabis will become legal in 2018. The Provincial Government will decide how non-medical cannabis will be distributed and sold within Alberta; one such regulation is that cannabis will be sold in cannabis-only retail stores, which will not be allowed to sell alcohol, tobacco or pharmaceuticals. Cannabis will also be available for purchase on-line through the Province.

Cannabis will be sold in private retail stores and through a provincially managed online system.

Stores will have to sell provincially licensed cannabis, and cannot sell cannabis with alcohol, tobacco or pharmaceuticals.

The provincial government has set rules for:

- the minimum separation distances between cannabis stores and places where children and youth gather; and
- tracking the distribution of cannabis from licensed producers to cannabis retail stores.

Just as the provincial government can further restrict federal regulations surrounding cannabis, municipalities will be able to set further restrictions on:

- where cannabis stores can be located (Sections A, B and C, below);
- regulations surrounding cannabis stores (Sections D and E, below);
- cannabis store operating hours (Section D, below); and
- business licensing requirements (Sections F and G, below).

Following the Community Information Feedback Session of May 10<sup>th</sup> and the on-line survey which were conducted to engage the Drayton Valley public, Administration is seeking Council's direction regarding the sale and consumption of cannabis in the community. The direction given today by Town Council will form the basis for the Bylaw which Administration will prepare and present to Council for First Reading.

When considering the designation of a cannabis retail store as either 'permitted' or 'discretionary', Council is being asked to determine if such a business:

 a. is able to be approved by Administration (permitted use), provided that it meets the requirements of the Land Use Bylaw;

### OR

b. requires referrals to adjacent landowners, with Council making the decision regarding approval or refusal (discretionary use).

Land Use Bylaw 2007/24/D authorizes the Development Authority (meaning the Development Officer) the ability to grant variances (reductions) of setbacks up to thirty (30%) percent. This means that the Development Officer could allow a setback of 100 metres to be reduced to 70 metres should that variance allowance be maintained for cannabis businesses. Should Council wish to reduce or eliminate the variance authority of the Development Authority as it relates to cannabis retail stores and/or cannabis counselling businesses, a clause will be required to be added to the amending Bylaw.

### **POTENTIAL MOTIONS:**

### Definition and Setbacks for Cannabis Retail Stores:

- A. That Council direct Administration to prepare a Resolution for Council which will uphold Land Use Amendment Bylaw (re: Adult Business) 2012/25/D and confirm:
  - a. cannabis retail stores as 'adult businesses' as defined; and
  - b. the 400 metre setbacks established therein.

### OR

That Council direct Administration to prepare a Land Use Amending Bylaw to address cannabis retail stores, which is to include:

a. a definition of cannabis retail stores;

- □ M (Industrial District), as a permitted use;

- DTDC (Downtown Revitalization Direct Control District), as a permitted use;
- DTDC (Downtown Revitalization Direct Control District), as a discretionary use;

OR

- □ as a DC (Direct Control) consideration only.
- B. That Council direct Administration to prepare the aforementioned Land Use Amending Bylaw to address cannabis retail stores by establishing setbacks between cannabis retail stores at \_\_\_\_\_ metres.

### Definition and Location of Cannabis Counselling Businesses

C. That Council direct Administration to prepare a Resolution for Council which will endorse cannabis counselling businesses as being included in the definition of 'personal service' (LUB, Section 3) and same will be permitted or discretionary under the existing land uses under the Town's Land Use Bylaw 2007/24/D.

### OR

That Council direct Administration to prepare the aforementioned Land Use Amending Bylaw to address cannabis counselling businesses, which is to include:

- a. a definition of cannabis counselling businesses;
- b. establish cannabis counselling business within lands zoned:
  - □ C1 (Central Commercial District), as a permitted use;
  - □ C1 (Central Commercial District), as a discretionary use;
  - □ C2 (General Commercial District), as a permitted use;
  - □ C2 (General Commercial District), as a discretionary use;
  - □ M (Industrial District), as a permitted use;
  - M (Industrial District), as a discretionary use;
  - DTDC (Downtown Revitalization Direct Control District), as a permitted use;
  - DTDC (Downtown Revitalization Direct Control District), as a discretionary use;

OR

as a DC (Direct Control) consideration only.

### Other Resolutions for Consideration - Specific to Conditions of Approval

Council may wish to consider the following conditions which could be applied to a cannabis retail store:

D. That Council direct Administration to prepare an Amending Bylaw for Land Use Bylaw, which includes conditions of Development Permit approval, specifically that:

Provincial Compliance

- a copy of the retail cannabis license issued by Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission shall be provided to the Town prior to occupancy as a condition of Development Permit approval; and/or
- impose a condition on any Development Permit issued for a cannabis retail store requiring that the development:
  - shall not commence until authorized by and compliant with all federal or provincial legislation; and
  - must commence within six (6) months of the date of approval of the Development Permit; and/or

Municipal Permits Requirement

- all cannabis retail stores require a Development Permit approved by the Town; and/or
- a cannabis retail store shall meet all applicable requirements of the respective district in which it is located; and/or

Hours of Operation

the maximum operating hours of a cannabis retail store shall be \_\_:\_\_ am/pm to \_\_:\_\_ am/pm; and/or

Advertising

- advertising and goods inside the premises of a cannabis retail store shall not be visible from the outside; and/or
- □ use of banner signs shall be prohibited; and/or

Separation / Building Restrictions

□ the cannabis retail store premises must operate separately from other businesses, including providing a separate loading space when one is required;

OR

a cannabis retail store may be established within a multi-tenant building or as a part of a mixed-use development (residential above, provided there is no common entry or way of passing from one unit to another; and/or

### OR

- the public entrance to the cannabis retail store must be direct to the outdoors and customer access to the premises is limited to a store-front that is visible from the street; and/or
- □ customer access from any lane or alley is strictly prohibited; and/or
- □ drive-through windows are prohibited; and/or
- a cannabis retail store must not be located on a parcel abutting an existing property that is being used for residential purposes on its main floor, but can be allowed on the main floor of a mixed-use building (residential above); and/or

### Site Requirements

- require lighting, landscaping or screening measures that ensure the proposed development is compatible with adjacent or nearby uses and comply with Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design measures; and/or
- prior to issuance of occupancy approval, conduct a site assessment, taking into account land use impacts including, but not limited to, exterior illumination, landscaping, screening, signs and access; and/or

### Parking

- no customer parking shall be located at the rear of the cannabis retail store premises; and/or
- all parking areas in front of the premises shall be well lit, to the satisfaction of the Town, during operating hours; and/or
- parking for a cannabis retail store shall be provided in accordance with the parking requirements for a retail store (LUB, Sections A32 and A33) and the parking requirements for the district in which it is located (LUB, Sections B11 through B14, B19, B20 and B24); and/or

### Storage Restrictions

- no outdoor storage of goods, materials or supplies shall be allowed on the site; and/or
- all garbage containers and waste material shall be fully enclosed within the building; and/or

### <u>Nuisance</u>

 the use shall not emit nuisances including, but not limited to, odour, noise or light, which may have a negative impact to adjacent sites or the surrounding area; and/or

### Variance

- the 30% variance may only be granted by the Development Authority to a cannabis retail store for the minimum separation distance between the proposed site of the retail cannabis store and the site of:
  - □ Schools □ Hospitals □ Parks and Playgrounds
  - □ Recreation Areas □ Liquor Stores
  - □ Residential Areas; and

OR

 no variance for the proposed development of a cannabis retail store shall be granted by the Development Authority and any proposed variance shall require approval of Town Council; and/or

### Signage for Cannabis Retail Stores and Cannabis Counselling Businesses

E. That Council direct Administration to prepare a Resolution for Council which will uphold Signage Bylaw 2012/16/D, with no requirement for amendment for cannabis retail stores or cannabis counselling businesses.

### OR

That Council direct Administration to prepare an Amending Bylaw for Signage Bylaw 2012/16/D, which includes requirements that:

- □ apply to exterior, permanent or affixed signs; and/or
- sandwich board signs;

AND/OR which states that:

graphics are limited/restricted to \_\_\_\_\_;

OR

□ graphics including \_\_\_\_\_\_ are prohibited;

OR

 any advertising or sign that is visible from the outside of the premises may contain only alpha-numeric characters and the business name;

AND/OR

size and number of signs are limited to \_\_\_\_\_;

AND/OR

□ reference to "Drayton Valley", "Drayton", "DV" or \_\_\_\_\_\_ is prohibited.

### **Business Licensing for Cannabis Retail Stores and Cannabis Counselling Businesses**

- F. That Council direct Administration to prepare a Resolution for Council which will uphold Business License Amending Bylaw (re: Adult Business) 2012/26/D and confirm:
  - a. cannabis retail stores as 'adult businesses' as defined; and
  - b. operations of cannabis retail stores under the requirements of 'adult businesses'.

### OR

That Council direct Administration to bring forward amendments to the Business License Bylaw to address cannabis businesses, which is to include:

- a. definitions of:
  - □ cannabis retail stores;
  - □ cannabis counselling business;
- b. restrictions specific to cannabis businesses, including a person carrying on a cannabis-related business must:
  - not allow a person to smoke, vape, consume or otherwise ingest cannabis or products containing cannabis on the premises; and/or
  - not display any advertising or sign that is visible from the outside of the premises except as the permitted under the Town's Signage Bylaw; and/or
  - not use the premises to carry on business other than the cannabis-related business and accessory use; and/or
  - at the time of application for the Business License, provide the names and direct contact information of any and all on-site manager(s), officer(s), director(s) or shareholder(s) of the licensee; and/or
  - promptly, and at least within \_\_\_\_\_ days, submit in writing to the municipality the name of any new on-site manager(s), officer(s), director(s) or shareholder(s) of the licensee;

## Business Licensing Fees for Cannabis Retail Stores and Cannabis Counselling Businesses

G. That Council direct Administration to maintain the 2018 Fee Schedule as is, with cannabis retail stores paying the Business License fee which applies to adult businesses and/or that cannabis counselling businesses paying the applicable resident or out-of-town fees for a Business License.

OR

That Council direct Administration to bring forward proposed amendments to the 2018 Fee Schedule to include Cannabis Retail Stores Business License Fee of \$\_\_\_\_\_.

### AND/OR

That Council direct Administration to bring forward proposed amendments to the 2018 Fee Schedule to include Cannabis Counselling Business License Fee of \$\_\_\_\_\_.

### FOLLOW-UP ACTION (PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT, COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY, AND

### **IMPLEMENTATION):**

Today's Council Meeting will provide clear direction to Administration regarding the preparation of the necessary Bylaw(s) for cannabis retail stores and cannabis counselling businesses in Drayton Valley. Administration will prepare the appropriate Bylaw(s) and present same to Council for First Reading, after which the Bylaw(s) will be publicized for further community feedback. Feedback received will be shared with Council for consideration prior to proceeding with the Bylaw(s).




## Q1 Do you support cannabis retail stores operating in Drayton Valley?




- Daycares, halfway houses, bottle depot, or community centres.





# Q6 What is your preferred approach to public cannabis consumption (smoke or vape)?





The following is a sampling of comments received in response to Question 6:

- Making it illegal in any public space is ridiculous! And totally unnecessary!






# Q9 What aspects of cannabis legalization are you most interested in or concerned about? (check all that apply)

- the Multiple benefits for everyone.




Q10 Which of the following age groups	s do you fall into?

### PROPOSAL AND BACKGROUND:

The Government of Canada has indicated that non-medical cannabis will become legal in 2018. The Province has indicated that it will maintain the minimum age to buy, possess and consume cannabis will be 18 in Alberta.

Provincial legislation mandates that "public smoking or vaping of cannabis in Alberta will be prohibited from any place where tobacco is restricted, and in the following places:

- on any hospital property, school property or child care facility property
- in or within a prescribed distance from:
  - o a playground
  - o a sports or playing field
  - o a skateboard or bicycle park
  - o a zoo
  - o an outdoor theatre
  - o an outdoor pool or splash pad
- from any motor vehicles, with the exception of those being used as a temporary residences, such as a parked RV

There will also be no consumption of cannabis at any cannabis retail outlets."

Municipalities will be able to set further restrictions on where cannabis can be consumed in public, should they wish. Municipalities do not have the ability to override provincial legislation, and as such the consumption of cannabis (smoking or vaping) in the above-noted areas cannot be usurped by municipal Bylaw. Accordingly, should Council wish to allow the consumption of cannabis at community festivals or events, the consumption would still be required to comply with provincial 'prescribed distances' of five (5) metres (per *Gaming and Liquor Amendment Regulation*, O.C. 027/2018, Section 129).

Following the Community Information Feedback Session of May 10<sup>th</sup> and the on-line survey which were conducted to engage the Drayton Valley public, Administration is seeking Council's direction regarding the sale and consumption of cannabis in the community. Direction received today will guide Administration in determining what, if any, changes are required to the Town's Smoking Bylaw 2003/18/P.

### **POTENTIAL MOTIONS:**

### **Consumption in Public:**

A. That Council direct Administration that no action is required, as the Town will defer to provincial legislation with respect to public consumption of cannabis.
